



New to the World of Motorsports My First Race ... My Car ... My Driver

going to be many more *firsts* in my **life.** With fantastic life experiences already behind me, I knew "grandchildren," still in the distant future, since my daughter isn't even married, would probably be one of my last *firsts* to enjoy.

Enter... the world of motorsports. As the flags waved for the start of the 2011 race season, I was front and center at the 49th Rolex 24 at Daytona. Vroom-vroom, my eyes

glued to number 07 ... my car for my very first sports car race!

Keep in mind that it was only 18 months ago that I acquired my very first convertible, ever, so what I called the car world, now more properly defined as *motorsports*, has been one *first* after another. My 2011 calendar is chock-full of fun and adventure, all firsts, and through the eyes of a newbie to motorsports.

But back to the 24 ... thanks to JANE member Peter Bourassa, I wasn't let loose on this adventure totally on my own. With a "letter of introduction" via email, I had the name of a driver and another female motorsports enthusiast, both enough to give me the confidence to jump in my sports car and head across the state to the Daytona International of those thrills of a Speedway.

The actual 24 started on Saturday, but I was too excited to wait. I arrived Thursday morning to soak in the preliminary events. Thank goodness. It took me a day to figure out that my fancy pass actually got me behind the glass windows of the car garages and that I didn't have to park outside the track and take the tram. I could drive up, close and personal, and park by the entrance to the FanZone! I also picked up a tip! There's something called the GRAND-AM trailer inside the Garage area, and just outside the trailer doors are labeled folders for every piece of technical information you need to *feel* intelligent. I picked up the entry lists, starting grids, and even a schedule of minute-to-minute activities. With the basic logistics behind me, I was off and running!

Once past the guards and behind the tall wired fences in the Garage area, I blended in. I looked like every other wide-eyed fan ... well, not every, since most were male. This new *sport* was already looking pretty good! Thanks to the guys in my Jaguar Club (JANE), I knew how to peer under the hood of a car and listen to sports car dialect. I quickly picked up the four classes to this weekend's events and when each raced. The GS and ST's took the track on Friday, after qualifying for position, to claim the first race on the newly-surfaced Daytona track, the 2.5-hour GRAND-AM Continental Tire Sports Car Challenge Race. Pretty impressive for me, since I'm into firsts. I decided to watch, standing against the fence at one of the early corners on the 3.56-mile road course. A great choice, as it gave me a chance to see all the flags waving up and down, and I was even closer to the garages, where the early wrecks were towed. I was right by all the action!

What struck me early on was the same thing I discovered during my adventures to Concours and car shows during the past 18 months. The people are so nice and so helpful. I was trying hard to soak in the volumes of information these men were so willing to share. I loved it, and was grateful for their answers to my questions.

I spent a fair amount of time in a sort of "Where's Waldo" hunt, for those old enough to remember that character. My search was for the driver I was to meet, and who had so kindly emailed me to say "come by and let's shake hands" ... he was already **my driver**, and we hadn't even met. What I had done, which was rather unusual for me, was to Google

was starting to wonder if there were him before leaving Clearwater. The Guardian Angel of Motorsports ... there it was on my computer screen. I had heard about this non-profit organization from Peter, but this was too magical. My driver was one of the co-founders, along with three of the other drivers of car o7. I was quickly bonding to a driver I hadn't even met! What I now had was a focus. I went around to over 80 garages looking for the Guardian Angel of Motorsports logo, and there it was on several cars, o7 and 65 in the GT class, 28 and 82 in ST, and forgive me for not jotting them down, but I know several others as well. Now I had four cars to watch. And that I did ... eyes glued. Thank goodness their colors stood out. Leave it to a woman to match up a car with its color!

Mu car, 07, was an orange Camaro, and first chance, I walked over looking for my driver. Of course, it wouldn't be until walking into the restaurant Friday evening for one lifetime, that I would meet him. Just as exciting, I met Katie, the wife of the owner of the **Banner Motorsports** car. I mentioned my driver's name, and of course Peter's as well, and bingo, it was like I was family. From that moment on, the owner of the car, the mechanics, and even the major sponsor, CoolTV, were




so kind and welcoming ... to me, a stranger. These wonderful people made my first sports car race so special, so engaging, and so much fun!

During my quest for the Guardian Angel of Motorsports logo, I spied car 82, a BMW 330ci, in the ST class, and got the nerve to strike up a conversation with a real live race car driver, a first. Amy Ambrose, a female motorsports enthusiast who actually drives her Porsche on the track at Monticello, had emailed me the names Dan Watkins and David Quinlan, also co-founders of Guardian Angel of Motorsports. Right before me was Dan, and with my "referral" status in place, Dan gave me my first lesson on the distinction between the classes. I actually contained my excitement and refrained from asking for his autograph. I found myself seated next to him at dinner that evening, so an exchange of contact information was a bit more age appropriate. That same evening, I met David and another female motorsports enthusiast with more of the technical knowledge, Adrienne. Besides learning about the track, flags, classes, and what it takes to be a driver, I was quickly learning that I don't own a race car! Although a first place winner in British car shows, my XKR and XK8 are drivers rather than racers, like the Porsches and Ferraris everyone seemed to own. Thank goodness I figured that out on Friday! On Saturday, my fancy pass to the Champion's Club also afforded me the opportunity to drive my car around the track for two laps. Since I also learned that the curves were almost vertical, I probably would have slid down the sides.

What was I thinking!

I walked into Caribbean Jack's Friday evening, 7 p.m. sharp, to attend a special dinner, and asked for the Bruce Ledoux party. Right before me, inches away, a kind and gentle man looked at me and said, "I'm Bruce" ... I said, "I'm Sandy" ... he offered me his arm and escorted me into the private room, and there I was, with **my driver**. Seconds later I met Linda, his beautiful and equally kind and gracious wife. From that moment on, I couldn't get enough of the Ledoux's and car o7 and the adventure they were all experiencing at the 24. That magical moment never ended. Saturday midday, I waltzed into the Champion's Club, with that fancy pass, and watched all the drivers pour into the courtyard beyond the windows. I asked the Club attendants if I could walk outside to watch, then could hardly contain myself when they said yes! And who should be there ... Linda, who so graciously motioned for me to sit with her and Bruce! It didn't matter that Patrick Dempsey (below, leaving the stands following team introductions) was in the same row, Bruce Ledoux was

my driver. So there I was, a newbie to motorsports and the race car world, sitting among the drivers listening to the GrandAm Official give race instructions. At that moment a lot came together. Wow, this is quite a sport! These drivers have to be pretty intelligent to put everything together, not to mention skillful. This didn't come as a total surprise, as Bruce, Dan, and David are extremely bright, successful businessmen. I listened to the cautions given to the drivers. I also got a primer on the rules, the role of the



pace car during periods of caution, and the logistics for making pit stops. I even learned that each car was allotted 30 pairs of tires for the event. Or at least I think that's what I heard. It seemed a lot to me, but oversized golf carts carrying tires were everywhere throughout the race. During conversation with **my driver** I learned about the driver rotation during the 24. It seems that fuel capacity really dictates the stretch of time each driver is on the track. With four drivers rotating every hour or so, they have time to rest up before going out again. Since my driver, Bruce, was up second, I was back and forth to the fence of the pits, watching the preparation rituals. The drivers actually suit up hours beforehand and the helmet goes on last, but with a significant amount of time for them to get used to it. He looked like an astronaut!

Well into the race, I watched 07 zoom in front of me and then turn the curve, packed like a sardine among two other cars. A jolt went through my body. I turned my head to look for o7 behind me. I was on the top deck of the Champion's Building and could quickly run around the entire roof to watch the cars weave around the track. I didn't see a bright orange car. Instantly, my head jerked to the TV monitor above, and there it was ... my car all crunched up. I thought I was going to cry, but didn't think that was something race fans did. I jumped out of my seat and flew down to the pits. Empty. I waited. Finally a single mechanic with the CoolTV. com logo on his shirt appeared, and I motioned for him to come over. He said they were in the Garage. Off I ran. And there before me was my

car. I asked about the driver ... he was fine; the car ... "mostly cosmetic," was the reply. I found that hard to believe.

What unfolded over the next few minutes was what I'll define as car surgery. I had already learned that each mechanic has a very specific skill set and responsibility on his car. To see them in action was amazing, especially with no fewer than 30 gawking fans around the car as the mechanics and owner blow torched, unscrewed, re-screwed, and duct taped the car back together. I always knew duct tape was fantastic, but it has risen to a new level of respect. I had watched a repair job on another car earlier in the race, so I knew what to expect when the car was ready to roll back on the track. The mechanics push it out of the garage and give it a shove, and zoom zoom, it races down the Garage strip among hundreds of fans just inches away, back onto the track. It's amazing no one gets run over!

Back to the "how nice everyone is." While having dinner in the Champion's Club, a lovely woman and her grandson, sister, and other assorted relatives sat down at my table. I learned that her husband owned the GAINSCO car, number 99, one of the Daytona Prototype cars being driven by Jon Fogarty, Alex Gurney, and Jimmie Johnson. I felt I could add 99 to my favorites since it wasn't a GT. By the time we finished chatting, I heard 99 had pulled into first, then later that evening I saw her again, and apparently they had brake line problems and the car had dropped to around 23rd. I guess sports car racing is like all sports. My daughter is a swimmer, so I've attended and timed my share of meets. It takes only a split second for things to change!

Sharp Cheddar Cheese Spread with Strawberry Jam Topping

- 1 pound extra-sharp cheddar cheese shredded (seriously sharp or hunter) (Note: If using pre-shredded cheese, the final mixture may be drier)
- 1 cup pecans chopped
- ¾ cup mayonnaise
- ½ small sweet onion finely chopped/grated (2 TBS.)
- 1 large garlic clove minced
- 1 cup strawberry jam
- Mix the onion, garlic, and mayo and set aside.
- Separately mix the cheese and pecans thoroughly; add the mayo mix.
- Spread on a platter and refrigerate overnight.
- Top w/jam when ready to serve garnish with a few whole pecans.
- Serve with a plain cracker like Ritz or Townhouse.

To be fancy, mold the cheese spread and when ready to serve, pour the jam in the middle of the mold.

Super Simple Chicago Chicken


- 1 envelope onion soup mix

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
