Where Does JANE Live?

If you don't see the list, make sure you select "Show Panel" in the upper left corner of the screen. Click on any of the locations and the map should zoom in to the selected location. You can make the map smaller or larger to see any particular area.










Adirondack Tour Saratoga Springs and Lake Placid, NY - May 18 - 21





Clean That Car!

Part 2 of a multi-part article on everything you need to know about our annual Concours By Tracey Levasseur

Last month I briefly explained the JANE Concours with its three divisions that members can choose to enter based on their particular car and intestinal fortitude. Now let's move on to preparing the car for that big day.

So you've decided to show your car in the JANE Concours. Congratulations! Regardless

of what division and class you enter, your car must be clean inside and out. Cleanliness is checked in almost every area by concours judges, and the maximum deductions can be quite high. This emphasizes the importance of a pristine entry. A car can be perfect with all original equipment, no dents or scratches, wood in flawless condition, seats look as though they'd never been sat in, but if the owner fails to vacuum the carpet properly, leaves wax residue on the trim, or neglects to clean brake dust off the wheels, this can mean the difference between first place and not placing at all. After all, it wasn't dirty when it rolled off the line in Coventry.

In the interest of space in *Coventry Cat* and the readers' attention spans, this article will brush upon only the important areas on the car to clean and suggest various tools and techniques to get the job done. I will refrain from going into depth on any particular process, and I will not recommend any particular product brands. This I may save for a future article (but I could probably write a whole book on that subject).

EXTERIOR DETAILING

The first thing the judges see is the outside of the car. So make believe you're a judge and evaluate your car. Do you have minor paint scratches, dusty wheels, dirt piled up in the back edge of your rocker panels, bug carcasses stuck to your windshield and headlights? Even if you think you are the most meticulous car detailer, you'd be surprised at what you may find. Now, there's a quick way to get most of the job done, and that is sending the car to a professional detailer. They'll do a satisfactory job (and it will cost you), then you can touch up little things the night before the show.

But for those of you who are gluttons for punishment and wish to do it yourself, a thorough detailing can take up to three hours or more to achieve a concours finish. Here is the proper order for cleaning the exterior:

Wash. There are hundreds of shampoos on the market. Get one that you like or is recommended by a reliable source, and use a sponge or wash mitt, a soft-bristled brush, and a couple of buckets. Follow by rinsing and drying with a lint-free towel or super absorbent chamois cloth so you won't get water spots. *Note:* Wash the wheels and tires last so brake dust won't transfer to the rest of the car from the brush.

Clay. Detailing clay exfoliates contaminants on the paint surface that won't come off with soap and water. Clay is mildly abrasive but won't damage paint surfaces when used properly. This step is important to do to remove harmful residues as well as prep the paint for a flawless polish

and wax. **Note:** Detailing clay should be used only once or twice a year depending on the car's use and exposure to the environment. Using clay more frequently will dull clear-coat finishes.

Polish. This step is necessary to remove minor scratches, scuffs, swirl marks, and pitted areas. Polishing can be done by hand or with a power polishing tool, but the end result should be a perfectly smooth paint finish.

Wax. The final step toward that ultimate shine. Waxes don't have abrasives or cleaning properties, they serve to give paint depth and appear liquid while repelling rain and other contaminants. Waxes may also be applied by hand or with a polisher. They come in natural forms, like Brazilian carnauba wax (not to be confused with a Brazilian wax job), and synthetic, made from polymers and acrylic resins.

Now the paint looks good, but that's only a part of the exterior. If your car is a soft-top convertible it should be cleaned and protected with an appropriate product. Canvas tops need different protectants than vinyl tops, but both should look factory fresh when you are finished treating them: no tears, stains, or faded spots.

Tires and wheels also have to be clean. Those of you with wire wheels know how hard it is to keep those spokes clean. Too bad! The judges will see if mud and brake dust are present, but they will also deduct if you did clean and polish those wheels but left globs of compound between the spokes. Get that soft-bristled brush in there and make those wheels sing. Also, make sure if you apply some tire-shining product that it doesn't run all over the wheels.



Trim. On some Jaguars, there may be more trim than paint! Trim consists of chrome bumpers, chrome embellishments, window molding, door gaskets, hood ornaments, windshield wipers, etc. With all these different materials, you will need several products to enhance and protect them. If your car's trim is fairly new and in good condition, simple protectants will make them stand out.

For example, if the rubber door gaskets look good, simply clean them off, spray on a vinyl and rubber protectant, let it sit a few minutes and then wipe off the excess. This will not only make them shine, it will prolong their life by keeping them from dry rotting. This same protectant can be sprayed on plastic and rubber trim all around the car. If the black plastic or rubber trim of your car is faded there are products that, when applied, will bring back that new black appearance ... at least temporarily.

Chrome, when in good shape, needs only a polishing with a chrome detailing product applied with a clean dry cloth. But what about those minor scuffs or that white chalky oxidation that can happen? The answer: steel wool. No, that's not a typo. Automotive stores carry various grades of steel wool. Ask for grade 0000 (that's four zeros). This super fine steel wool will not scratch chrome, but works like detailing clay to remove contaminants on the chrome's surface. Once the contaminants are gone you're left with clean, super shiny chrome.

INTERIOR DETAILING

The inside of your car, depending on the model, may have even more parts to clean. But since a judge also inspects all visible areas inside the vehicle, it's essential that it looks as clean as it did when new, sitting at the dealership.

Before cleaning anything, purge the car of any objects that were NOT part of the car when it left Coventry. This includes the ice scraper, the paraphernalia hanging from the rearview mirror, and any objects in plain sight. You can stash them in closed cubbies or the glovebox, where judges don't go, if they fit. If you're entered in Champion Division don't put your junk in your trunk, because that needs to be cleaned and judged as well!

Since a complete interior cleaning can take up to five hours it's best to split the tasks over a couple days. Also, as with exterior, interior cleaning should be tackled in proper order:

Vacuum. Use a good plug-in vacuum to clean carpets, under the floor mats, and in between the seat piping (where applicable). Don't forget the headliner! You'd be surprised at the stuff that sticks to a cloth headliner. Vacuuming these areas helps assess where you may have to use a rug shampoo or other liquid cleaner to remove stains.

Overall wash. Next, fill a bucket with water and an all-purpose cleaning product mild enough to use on plastic, leather, wood, and metal. Using a cloth rag, go over all surfaces, dashboard, door panels, door gaskets and door sills, roof pillars, seats, pedals, steering wheel, and occasional tables (where applicable). These areas are judged, so should be spotless. For those heater vents, first blow them out with compressed air (the kind to clean computer keyboards). It may be necessary to take q-tips dipped in cleaner and remove dust from the vent veins.

Protectants. These products have two purposes: to protect their

intended surfaces and to give a shine or like-new appearance. Jaguar interiors have various materials requiring several different products.

Leather is most prevalent, and there are several products available to keep it soft and supple. Use a leather conditioner to maintain that newness and prevent future cracking and tearing. Conditioner is like hand lotion, apply it liberally to the surface (remember some Jaguars have leather on the dashboard, door panels, and steering wheel, so condition those as well), and let it soak in for a few minutes before wiping off excess with a lint-free cloth.

Wood veneer resides in most Jaguars, and as we know, over time the clear finish begins cracking. It's unavoidable. However, this doesn't mean the wood is beyond protection. Whether your car's veneer is cracked or not, it should be treated with a product that offers UV protection and sealant to keep cracks

from forming or widening for as long as possible. The same wax you use on your car's paint can serve the same function on the wood trim without buying additional product. Application is the same as on the paint, just make sure to avoid getting wax on other surfaces or carpet.

For all the plastic bits, a vinyl and plastic protectant with UV protection works best to achieve that shiny, new look. This kind of protectant can be very slick when applied liberally. Make sure to spray or wipe it on, let it sit on the surface for a few minutes, and then thoroughly wipe off excess.

Glass. When your car is judged, all windows must be up. So it's important to assure all glass is clean inside and out, free of protectant overspray, bug guts, bird droppings, and streaks. A good cleaning should be done after all the interior and exterior work is complete, and a touch-up upon arrival on the show grounds, especially if you drove it there. And don't forget to clean those headlights as well.

If you're entered in Champion or Special Divisions you'll need to clean your engine and boot compartments. In Champion, not only is the condition and originality of your engine judged, but cleanliness is also scrutinized. Your boot compartment must be clean and contain only those items that came with the car from Coventry: spare tire, tool kit, operator's manuals, etc. For Special Division, the judges will inspect the boot and engine compartments for condition and cleanliness, not authenticity. So these spaces will also need careful attention.



This sounds like an awful lot of work, and it is. But if you get a regular cleaning routine going on your car, then most of this stuff may not need to be done, leaving you with just touching up on the morning of the show. If you follow these cleaning tips, your car will be immaculate and you will have an edge over your competition at the concours.

Or should we be proud of our logo? As the sage once said, "Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery."

A little sleuthing on the Internet finds the website of the club, "Jaguazur French Riviera Club," at www. jaguazur.com. It appears to be an active club with beautiful Jaguars and events much like ours ... rallies, parties, polo matches ... all along the

French Riviera. It doesn't get much better than that! The website reveals that Jaguazur was founded in 2007, a relatively young organization compared to JANE. (Our club, JANE, is a reorganization in 1986 of the original New England Jaguar club, NEXKA, founded in 1968.)

This discovery raises the question of origin of our own logo? Who designed it, and when? Some more sleuthing was required to find out this piece of history. Telephone interviews with JANE veterans yielded nothing, but everybody said, "Ask Gary." Yes, Gary Hagopian knew where to go to get the story ... Barry Breen from Windham, NH. Barry was one of the original members of JANE when it was reorganized and renamed by Peter Gould and others. Peter was the owner of British Auto, now SNG Barratt, in Manchester, NH. Barry said that he commissioned a commercial artist to come up with the design in 1986 as part of the reorganization. He didn't recall the name of the artist, but did say he paid her a small fee for the design.

The design was good enough for a version of it to be used for the JCNA National Concours hosted by JANE in August 1987. An original patch and a keychain with this logo resides in the JANE archives.

Harry Parkinson updated the logo in June 2001, replacing the "blue leaper" with a white one and cleaning up some of the details. Today's logo has been unchanged since then.

So what should we do about the imitation? One suggestion is that our esteemed President, Michael
