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
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# Club Monthly Meeting Attendance Record Set

The course is designed to improve the control and stability of your response time on a limited, controlled circuit.

One of my jobs for JCNA is serving as a member of the Membership Committee. The Committee was formed last year, with representatives from each of the six JCNA regions, to address the stagnant JCNA membership numbers. Over the last several months we've identified and discussed at length a number of initiatives to help JCNA-affiliated clubs recruit and retain members. Each Committee member will be establishing contact with the President and Membership Chair of all the clubs in their respective Region and will work with them as we implement some of the planned initiatives. One of the first initiatives is to share a paper with all clubs describing the "effective practices" gathered from our collective experiences. I'm happy to say that JANE was able to contribute a large portion of those practices. The Committee's overall goal is to make the local club and JCNA "membership experience" the best of ANY car club!

But before the Committee proceeds too far, it was felt that we needed to understand what current members feel are the strong and weak points of their individual clubs and of JCNA. The Inn at Bay Pointe is located at 64 Washington Court, Quincy, MA. The main number 617-472-3200.

Proceed down 95/93 (the old Route 128). At the "split," bear right to take Route 3 South to Exit 7 toward Braintree/Cape Cod. Merge onto Burgin Parkway via Exit 19 toward Quincy Center and follow for about 2 miles. Turn right onto Walter J. Hannon Parkway and follow for approximately 0.5 miles. Walter J. Hannon Parkway becomes Mayor Thomas McGrath Highway. Follow this street for approximately 1 mile. Turn right onto Washington Street/Route 3A and follow for about 1.2 miles. Look for the blue oval "Inn at Bay Pointe" sign (just past Wild Wiley's Burgers on the left). Turn left onto Washington Court. Follow Washington Court into Bay Pointe Marina.

While some folks traveled independently, most joined the caravan at service areas in either Kennebunk or West Gardiner, Maine. From there we proceeded up the scenic Maine coast via Belfast, arriving in Bar Harbor with time to check into the Bar Harbor Inn and have a short rest before our traditional welcome reception. Our rooms in the Inn's Oceanfront Lodge offered beautiful views of the harbor and offshore islands. In the late afternoon we moved on to the Ivy Manor Inn for the reception, sponsored by Jaguar Scarborough. Our hosts at the Ivy Manor Inn, John and Christine Poole, provided a wonderful offering of Acadia mussels, Swedish meatballs, sesame soy chicken wings, a gourmet cheese platter, and veggie and fruit trays. The food just kept coming – there was no excuse for anyone to go away hungry! Several Jaguars were

parked in front of the Inn and represented 61 years of the Jaguar heritage - including members' cars from as early as 1953 right up to three beautiful new cars from Jaguar Scarborough – an XJ, an XF, and a beautiful new F-Type Coupe in Italian Racing Red! By the time the evening was over, Bar Harbor was buzzing about the beautiful Jaguars that were in town. Heads were turning and cameras were snapping all weekend long as our cars rolled through the streets.

On a glorious, sunny Friday morning, participating cars gathered in the parking lot at the Acadia National Park Visitor Center for a group photo. What an impressive sight! Only two cars were missing from the lineup – Mark and Bev Lenci's arrival in their 1972 Series III E-Type was delayed due to a flat tire and, sadly, Bob Mitchell's 1949 Triumph 2000, which died en route in Bucksport and had

to return to New Hampshire on a trailer. Since the Triumph was the backup to Bob's XJ6, which was itself the backup to his MK IX, it just proves again that you can never have too many British cars in the stable if you really want to go somewhere!

From the Visitor Center we drove the winding road up to a very windy Cadillac Mountain, the highest point on the U.S. East Coast – and for part of the year, the first place in the U.S. to see the sunrise. The view over Bar Harbor and Frenchman Bay is breathtaking!

Leaving the mountain, we proceeded along the Park Loop Road, with stops at Sand Beach (for a group photo), Thunder Hole, Otter Cliffs, and various other scenic points. We rejoined at the Fabbri Picnic Area for sandwiches and camaraderie. We then proceeded on to one of the bridges on Acadia's famous carriage roads, where our cars paused for individual photos under the triple-arch stone bridge. It was then on to Jordan Pond for a stop in the gift shop before everyone made their individual return to Bar Harbor.

Friday evening was "dinner on your own," but several members took advantage of a special "Taste of Bar Harbor

Pub Tour" sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. It was a great chance to sample some regionally-produced beer and wine and find a suitable place for dinner.

Overcast skies greeted the group as we set off Saturday morning for a short drive to the Seal Cove Automobile Museum, arriving just as the rain began. While heavy rain poured outside, we enjoyed a narrated tour of the museum by its Executive Director, Roberto Rodriguez. Although the museum isn't large, it houses a variety of rare, historic cars, including what is arguably the finest collection of "Brass Era" automobiles in the U.S., many of which have won awards at Pebble Beach and Amelia Island, and three that have taken part in the famous London to Brighton Run. "Brass Happy tourers gathered at Galyn's Restaurant Saturday evening Era" cars are very early automobiles characterized by their gleaming brass headlights and trim. Have you ever seen an

1899 DeDion Bouton Model G, "Vis à vis"? How about a 1904 Knox touring car, built for the president of the company, or a 1904 Curved Dash Olds Model 6C? There's also a 1910 White Steamer Model MM Pullman Touring car that was used to chauffer President William Howard Taft, a 1913 Peugeot wood-bodied "skiff," a 1914 Stanley "Mountain Wagon" - and the list goes on, including several very early Indian and other motorcycles. Of particular interest to those familiar with the Larz Anderson Auto Museum was a 1911 American Victoria Tourist owned by Larz Anderson when he was Ambassador to Belgium. The Andersons brought the car with them when they returned to the U.S. and it became the favorite vehicle of his wife, Isabel. Researchers were puzzled by the inscription "Captain Ginger" on the side of the car, but eventually found it came from a series of children's books that Isabel had written – the main character was "Captain Ginger"! Richard C. Payne was the discriminating collector who amassed most of the collection, but he kept very few records of where the cars came from or their history. Roberto Rodriguez has undertaken the daunting chore of documenting the history of each car. His detailed knowledge of the cars allowed him to give an excellent tour, with interesting stories about each car. Although visits to auto museums are often "guy" events, the ladies in our

group found this to be an exceptionally interesting visit – perhaps the best automobile museum they'd ever visited. Some of them commented that these cars are more like works of art than automobiles! Anyone with any interest in historic automobiles should not miss this museum, a real hidden gem,

if you visit the Bar Harbor region.

By the time we left the museum the rain had slowed

# The Search for a Jaguar XK120SE (My Jaguar Experience)

The search for my XK120SE OTS really began in the 1960s when I was at Colgate University in Hamilton, New York. Another student was selling his XK120 for \$750. The price seemed just right for the most beautiful car in the world. My dad would not allow the purchase, and I respected my parents. The dream was postponed.

My junior year I bought and drove a white 1954 Ford convertible with a V8 engine that drank almost as much oil as gas. Oil was cheap by the gallon, and the trunk could hold a lot of oil.

Blizzard conditions often occurred on the trips between my parents' house in Pelham Manor, New York, in Westchester County to Colgate University in Hamilton, New York. There were actually stories of people driving off the roads in the farm country of Upstate New York and not being found until spring, frozen to death. A car ride to school was \$2.50. That paid for gas, and riders meant security. Six in a car gave manpower to push a vehicle back on the road if needed. Safety in numbers was the rule.

After graduation I got a job at J. Walter Thompson Advertising Agency in Manhattan as a copywriter. One day a friend at work said, "My sister works at J.S. Inskip Rolls Royce and Jaguar. They are throwing out Jaguar press photos and news releases. Let's go." We ran all the way. I grabbed all I could carry. Today I have press releases and a publicity photo of a white XK120 OTS along with a beautiful professional model. She is posed holding a leashed jaguar. The model ... the exotic jungle cat ... next to the namesake car. This picture is truly worth a thousand words.

Miracles happen. One day I discovered a 1960 Jaguar XK150S for sale at Griffin Ford in New Rochelle, New York. The owner had a large family and needed to trade in his Jaguar for a Ford Country Squire station wagon. I marveled at the triple SU carburetors on the OTS and the magnificent XK engine. The driving manual, with its brown, bark-like cover and foldout cutaway line drawing of the car was hypnotic. I was in love.

I bought my 150S for \$2,227, and I drove my Jaguar as my only car for fifteen years when I was in my twenties and thirties. Greenwich Village, New York, Old Town in Chicago, Pelham Manor, New York in Westchester County, and North Scituate, Massachusetts were garage locations over the years.

The best garage deal was in Greenwich Village in New York City, where I persuaded the Mexican who ran the



Minetta Garage that my Jaguar was a compact car and should be charged no more than a VW bug. He agreed. My monthly fee was \$32.50, and I was on the first floor, just inside the front door. Very convenient and cheap for Manhattan.

The past is filled with memories. The XK150S's three SU carbs were a mystery to most mechanics. A fellow member of the Westchester Sports Car Club synchronized them using a stethoscope. His job? Barnes Engineering. He spent one year making a hatch on a U.S. government satellite to dependably open and close correctly while in

Years later, when the frame on my XK150S rotted out, I was in my thirties. No time or cash for restoration. Asad goodbye to my OTS after fifteen years as my only car and joy beyond description.

Two years ago, through my Scottish friend Glen McLachlan, my wife, Bonnie, and I were introduced to the Jaguar Association of New England. The camaraderie and helpful information generously given to us by many members aided in our car search and enjoyment of the Jaguar Experience. I always tell Bonnie, "We learn so much because these members are so generous with their knowledge and experience."

Memories of my XK150S float back from time to time. As the old Scottish song goes, "Those days are gone now and in the past they must remain—but we can rise now and be a nation again."

"A nation again" — heck, I can be a Jaguar owner again. I may be 73 years old by my birth certificate, but I think I'm 20. I have never lost my dream of an XK120SE.

The Jaguar Association of New England is awesome. At the JANE get-together in Sturbridge, Massachusetts, John Feng gave me a ride in his magnificent silver XK120SE. My wife, Bonnie, said the ride she got started out very slowly until she said, "This is not like the run you gave my husband."

John replied, "You want fast and loud?"

Bonnie said, "Yes." She said the next thing she knew she was looking for a grab handle.

John told me the story of his long search for an XK120, which included travel beyond imagination. He suggested that I call Tom Jaycox, which I did. Tom knew of a 120 that was owned by a man in Staten Island, New York. He visited the car only to find the owner was not ready to sell because of sentimental reasons. The car had belonged to his dad, who had passed away. Also, the price was out of line for the condition.

At this point, I emailed Roy Sumner in Gordonsville, Virginia, who was advertising his 1954 XK120 Special Equipment. Matching numbers and Heritage Certificate, plus the color combination of cream body paint and red leather interior were exactly what I wanted. Roy gave me references of two men who had known him and his Jaguar for fifteen years. Both had been Jaguar Club presidents and Concours judges. I called them and liked what they said.

My motto has always been — "Do everything right away." Bonnie and I got up at 3:00AM in Scituate, Massachusetts, to take a Jet Blue flight bound for Richmond, Virginia. We rented a car and drove two hours to Gordonsville, which is horse country. Fog, rain, and snow had disappeared, and we found Roy and Sue Sumner at their beautiful home at

the end of a mile-and-a-half-long gravel driveway. The magnificent cream color XK120SE was in a Car Coon next to an XKE in their garage.

Roy and Sue patiently answered our questions and thoughtfully told us the XK120SE's story in captivating British accents, which enhanced the environment as we admired my favorite example of Sir William Lyons's creations. Next, we tried to control our excitement as we bought our XK120SE.

After paperwork and promises to keep in touch, Roy mentioned he wanted to apply finish to his concrete garage floor. I told him that Dennis Eklof had written an authoritative article on his personal investigation of this very subject in our JANE newsletter, *The Coventry Cat*. When Bonnie and I returned home, I asked Dennis to send the article to Roy. He did and Roy thanked all concerned.

All in all, the Jaguar Experience enhances life. Thank you, Sir William Lyons. We love our 1954 Jaguar XK120SE OTS.

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



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
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
